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## **General Searching Advice:**

### **Search Smart:**

- If a site does not seem to be responding well to your search (for instance, if it is not pulling up any jobs), broaden your search criteria. However, if your search continues to yield few or no results, you may want to move on to sites that are of more interest to you or are more closely aligned with your search criteria.

### **Keywords:**

- Most of these sites will give you a drop-down box and ask you to choose the career category that you want to search. Many of them will have “legal” as a category. If there is not a category for legal, look for something similar like “compliance,” “regulatory,” or “professional.”
- Also, when typing in keywords, the keyword “attorney” seems to work best, but if you aren’t getting any hits try different words like “lawyer,” “law,” or “law clerk.” If you are getting a lot of hits then you can narrow your keyword search to terms like: “associate attorney,” “trial attorney,” or “civil rights attorney.”

### **Things to remember:**

- Always check the dates of the job posting to make sure the posting is current and the position is still open. If you are finding old listings that you are interested in, check the contact information. With a quick, friendly email or phone call, you could find out if the position is still available or if they have similar jobs available.

### **Having the search engines do your work for you:**

- Many of these websites have a feature which allows you to type in your search criteria, save it as a “job agent”, and have the site periodically search for jobs with your criteria. If the site comes up with any matches using your search criteria they will send you an email. This is a handy feature, because there are so many websites to search. *If you really want to do this right*, take your time fine-tuning your search criteria with that particular site so you know that it will pull up jobs you are interested in.

### **So many sites, so little time...**

- There are a lot of sites to use when job searching. Not all these sites will work for everyone. Browse through the sites and see which ones suit you. If a particular site doesn’t bring up jobs you are interested in, that’s ok, just go on to the next.
- Be aware that a lot of these sites overlap. Many of these sites pull up all kinds of different attorney jobs. Therefore, if you know you want a job in intellectual property and you search all the intellectual property specific sites we have listed and haven’t found a perfect match- don’t give up there. Other sites will pull up intellectual property jobs, even if that site wasn’t listed under the intellectual property listing.

## Legal Search Engines

- Since this is a website that posts legal jobs, you can choose the areas of law that you are interested in when using the advanced search engine. You can also search by region, and the website will sort the jobs by the date they are listed.
- You can't apply for jobs through the website, but they do give you the contact information to get your job search going.

- Since this is searching through legal jobs, you can choose which position you are looking for: associate, law clerk, etc then you must choose the state in which you want to search.
- You can set up an account so that the site will email you as new jobs open.
- This site lists **firms** of all sizes that are looking for attorneys
- You can apply online.
- **Disadvantages:** there is no advanced search option, so you have to search through 1 state at a time.

- Click on the "search jobs" link.
- This will bring you to a page that allows you to narrow your search by choosing a specified region of the united states (you can choose more than 1 region), specify an expected salary, specify your education level, and indicate whether you want full time or part time.
- This site is really fast and easy to use.
- **Disadvantages:** This site is a little tricky to navigate, if it seems like you have gotten away from the law jobs, you will probably just have to re-type the address into your browser. It is probably just best to use the back and forward buttons to navigate this site.

- Click on "job search" at the top of the screen.
- This is geared towards legal searching, so you can really narrow to the type of law you are interested in.
- **Advantages:** This site pulls up jobs all over the country.
  - This site is fast and easy to use.
  - This site has profiles of the companies that are posting these jobs, so you can do research about a potential employer right through the site.

  - The best way to find the job clerk listings is to click on “search,” then type in clerkship or if you know there is a particular type of clerkship (ie, law clerk to appellate division justice, law clerk to chief justice, etc). After you click on search, then you have to scroll down to the bottom of the page and the site will pull up a bunch of links.
